Fun Facts:

- The Center for Agribusiness and Economic Development has determined Georgia's Economic Value of Pollination to be \$635,094,003!
- Georgia boasts over 160 species of butterflies and more than 500 species of native wild bees.
- The honeybee became Georgia's state insect in 1975. European honeybees are not native to Georgia. Records show they arrived in the state by 1743.
- One out of every 3-4 mouthfuls of food we eat and beverages we drink are delivered to us by pollinators. Georgia's primary pollinators include bees, wasps, birds (especially hummingbirds), butterflies, moths, flies, mosquitoes, beetles, ants, slugs, and snails.
- Georgia Department of Transportation is installing and maintaining 15 pollinator habitat sites at rest areas and Welcome Centers across the state. To find where the pollinator gardens are click <u>here</u>.
